an account of four royal women that is as inherently fascinating as it is exceptionally informative an extraordinary read from beginning to end midwest book review once upon a time there were four kings called george who thanks to a quirk of fate ruled great britain for over a century hailing from germany these occasionally mad bad and infamous sovereigns presided over a land in turmoil yet what of the remarkable women who were crowned alongside them from the forgotten princess locked in a tower to an illustrious regent a devoted consort and a notorious party girl the queens of georgian britain lived lives of scandal romance and turbulent drama whether dipping into politics or carousing on the shores of italy caroline of ansbach charlotte of mecklenburg strelitz and caroline of brunswick refused to fade into the background queens of georgian britain offers a chance to step back in time and meet the women who ruled alongside the georgian monarchs not forgetting sophia dorothea of Celle the passionate princess who never made it as far as the throne from lonely childhoods to glittering palaces via family feuds smallpox strapping soldiers and plenty of scheming these are the queens who shaped an era a lively deep dive into the lives of four women regularly overshadowed by their husbands curzon is a captivating writer and this book is an impressive addition to her existing georgian books the lazy historian curzon has a breezy colloquial style an easy and informative read historical novels review this is a fully annotated scholarly anthology of selected excerpts from the gentleman's magazine concerning topics of crime medicine science and natural history archaeology religion parliamentary reporting the american colonies the french revolution riots and radicalism and literary criticism established in 1731 and generally considered the first major magazine in england it constitutes an enormous and scarcely tapped source for scholarly investigation of hanoverian culture and society after a general introduction nine chapters contain annotated excerpts from the first 100 years of publication arranged topically chosen to cover the widest possible range of aspects of georgian life this book explores english single sheet satirical prints published from 1780 1820 the people who made those prints and the businesses that sold them it examines how these objects were made how they were sold and how both the complexity of the production process and the necessity to sell shaped and constrained the satiric content these objects contained it argues that production sale and environment are crucial to understanding late georgian satirical prints a majority of these prints were after all published in london and were therefore woven into the commercial culture of the great wen because of this city and its culture the activities of the many individuals involved in transforming a single satirical design into a saleable and commercially viable object were underpinned by a nexus of making selling and consumption neglecting any one part of this nexus does a disservice both to the late georgian satirical print these most beloved objects of british art and to the story of their late georgian apotheosis a story that james baker develops not through the designs these objects contained but rather through those objects and the designs they contained in the making a fascinating social history of the guitar reasserting its long forgotten importance in romantic england this book is the first to explore the popularity and novelty of the guitar in georgian england noting its impact on the social cultural and musical history of the period the instrument possessed an imagery as rich as its uses were varied it emerged as a potent symbol of romanticism and was incorporated into poetry portraiture and drama in addition british and irish soldiers returning from war in spain and portugal brought with them knowledge of the spanish owned grand estates and houses who commissioned famous architects and who embarked upon elaborate architectural schemes hidden patrons dismantles this myth revealing instead that women were at the heart of the architectural patronage of the day exerting far more influence and agency than has previously been recognised architectural drawing and design discourse and patronage were interests shared by many women in the eighteenth century far from being the preserve of elite men architecture was a passion shared by both sexes intellectually and practically as long as they possessed sufficient wealth and autonomy in an accessible readable account hidden patrons uncovers the role of women as important patrons and designers of architecture and interiors in eighteenth century britain and ireland exploring country houses georgian townhouses villas estates and gardens it analyses female patronage from across the architectural spectrum and examines the work of a range of zoological

societies of the victorian era as the british empire expanded and seaborne trade flooded into london s ports the menagerists gained access to animals from the most far flung corners of the globe and these strange creatures became the objects of fascination and wonder many aristocratic families sought to create their own private menageries with which to entertain their guests while for the less well heeled touring exhibitions of exotic creatures both alive and dead satisfied their curiosity for the animal world while many exotic creatures were treasured as a form of spectacle others fared less well turtles went into soups and civet cats were sought after for ingredients for perfume in this entertaining and enlightening book plumb introduces the many tales of exotic animals in london the first part of this book describes the development of the georgian style beginning with its introduction in the early eighteenth century in britain and the colonies in the 1740s metropolitan areas on america s east coast particularly the cities of boston philadelphia charleston and alexandria were beginning to show excellent examples of georgian architecture in the second part of the book a chapter is devoted to each element of the house roofs stonework brick doors and windows fireplaces and moldings are examined stressing the need for today s occupants to understand the ideas techniques and materials employed by the original builders this book enables the preservationist historian architect carpenter and decorator to understand the craftsmanship and context of the georgian house perhaps the most significant development of the georgian theater was its multiplication of ethnic colonial and provincial character types parading across the stage in theatrical nation michael ragussis opens up an archive of neglected plays and performances to examine how this flood of domestic and colonial others showcased england in general and london in particular as the center of an increasingly complex and culturally mixed nation and empire and in this way illuminated the shifting identity of a newly configured great britain in asking what kinds of ideological work these ethnic figures performed and what forms were invented to accomplish this work ragussis concentrates on the most popular of the outlandish englishmen the stage jew scot and irishman theatrical nation understands these stage figures in the context of the government s controversial attempts to merge different ethnic and national groups through the 1707 act of union with scotland the jewish naturalization bill of 1753 and the act of union with ireland of 1800 exploring the significant theatrical innovations that illuminate the central anxieties shared by playhouse and nation ragussis considers how ethnic identity was theatricalized even as it moved from stage to print by the early nineteenth century anglo irish and scottish novelists attempted to deconstruct the theater s ethnic stereotypes while reimagining the theatricality of interactions between english and ethnic characters an important shift took place as the novel s cross ethnic love plot replaced the stage s caricatured male stereotypes with the beautiful ethnic heroine pursued by an english hero the movement from tradition to modernity engulfed all of the jewish communities in the west but hitherto historians have concentrated on the intellectual revolution in germany by moyses mendelssohn in the second half of the eighteenth century as the decisive event in the origins of jewish modernity in the jews of georgian england todd m endelman challenges the germanocentric orientation of the bulk of modern jewish historiography and argues that the modernization of european jewry encompassed far more than an intellectual revolution his study recounts the rise of the anglo jewish elite great commercial and financial magnates such as the goldsmids the franks samson gideon and joseph salvador destruction of business records and other primary sources has hampered investigation of this trade but recent research into legal proceedings apprenticeship registers surviving correspondence and other archived documentation has enabled aspects of its workings to be reconstructed the first part of the book deals with longman broderip arguably the foremost english music seller in the late eighteenth century and the firm s two successors broderip wilkinson and muzio clementi s variously styled partnerships who carried on after longman broderip s assets were divided in 1798 the next part shows how a rival music seller john bland and his successors used textual and thematic catalogues to advertise their publications this is followed by a comprehensive review of the development of musical copyright in this period a report of efforts by a leading inventor charles 3rd earl stanhope to transform the ways in which music was printed and recorded and a study of georg jacob vollweiler s endeavour to introduce music lithography into england the book should appeal not only to music historians but also to readers interested in english business history publishing history and legal history between 1714 and 1830

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
