this book briefly examines the causes and warning signs of teen suicide and presents ways to help prevent it provides positive advice and encouragement to the person thinking about committing suicide on suicide is neither a defense of suicide nor an invitation to assisted suicide but an analysis of the state of mind of those who are suicidal and who actually do commit suicide it is also a strident defense of the freedom of the individual and a plea for the recognition of the fact that we belong to ourselves before belonging to another person or an institution nation or religion and that our right to choose to end our life can have priority over social entanglements and biological destiny book jacket suicide would appear to be the last taboo even incest is now discussed freely in popular media but the suicide of a loved one is still an act most people are unable to talk about or even admit to their closest family or friends this is just one of the many painful and paralyzing truths author carla fine discovered when her husband a successful young physician took his own life in december 1989 and being unable to speak openly and honestly about the cause of her pain made it all the more difficult for her to survive with no time to say goodbye she brings suicide survival from the darkness into light speaking frankly about the overwhelming feelings of confusion guilt shame anger and loneliness that are shared by all survivors fine draws on her own experience and on conversations with many other survivors as well as on the knowledge of counselors and mental health professionals she offers a strong helping hand and invaluable guidance to the vast numbers of family and friends who are left behind by the more than thirty thousand people who commit suicide each year struggling to make sense of an act that seems to them senseless and to pick up the pieces of their own shattered lives and perhaps most important for the first time in any book she allows survivors to see that they are not alone in their feelings of grief and despair this book contains proven steps and strategies on how to recognize suicidal behavior in your friends and family suicidal acts and attempts are phenomena that have been committed from one generation to another all around the world why do some

socioeconomic family and individual crisis situations e.g. loss of a loved one employment honour the economic costs associated with completed and attempted suicide are estimated to be in the billions of dollars one million lives lost each year are more than those lost from wars and murder annually in the world it is three times the catastrophic loss of life in the tsunami disaster in Asia in 2005 every day of the year the number of suicides is equivalent to the number of lives lost in the attack on the World Trade Center Twin Towers on 9/11 in 2001 everyone should be aware of the warning signs for suicide someone threatening to hurt or kill him/herself or talking of wanting to hurt or kill him/herself someone looking for ways to kill him/herself by seeking access to firearms available pills or other means someone talking or writing about death dying or suicide when these actions are out of the ordinary for the person also high risk of suicide is generally associated with hopelessness rage uncontrolled anger seeking revenge acting reckless or engaging in risky activities seemingly without thinking feeling trapped like there's no way out increased alcohol or drug use withdrawing from friends family and society anxiety agitation unable to sleep or sleeping all the time dramatic mood changes no reason for living no sense of purpose in life

Myth: Suicidal people just want to die
Fact: Most of the time suicidal people are torn between wanting to die and wanting to live
Most suicidal individuals don't want death they just want to stop the great psychological or emotional pain they are experiencing
Listen accept the person's feelings as they are do not be afraid to talk about suicide directly ask them if they developed a plan of suicide expressing suicidal feelings or bringing up the topic of suicide giving away prized possessions settling affairs making out a will signs of depression loss of pleasure sad mood alterations in sleeping eating patterns feelings of hopelessness
Myth: People who commit suicide do not warn others
Fact: Eight out of every 10 people who kill themselves give definite clues to their intentions they leave numerous clues and warnings to others although clues may be non-verbal or difficult to detect
Remove lethal means for suicide from person's home
Remind the person that depressed feelings do change with time
Point out when death is chosen it is irreversible
Change of behavior poor work or school performance risk taking behaviors increased use of alcohol or drugs social isolation developing a specific plan for suicide
Myth: People who talk about suicide are only trying to get attention they won't really do it
Fact: Few commit suicide without first letting someone know how they feel
Those who are considering suicide give clues and warnings as a cry for help
Over 70% who do threaten to commit suicide either make an attempt or complete the act
Express your concern for the person develop a plan for help with the person seek outside emergency intervention at a hospital mental health clinic or call a suicide prevention center
Myth: Don't mention suicide to someone who's showing signs of depression it will plant the idea in their minds and they will act on it
Fact: Many depressed people have already considered suicide as an option discussing it openly helps the suicidal person sort through the problems and generally provides a sense of relief and understanding
Suicide is preventable
Most suicidal individuals desperately want to live they are just unable to see alternatives to their problems
Most suicidal individuals give definite warnings of their suicidal intentions but others are either unaware of the significance of these warnings or do not know how to respond to them
Talking about suicide does not cause

someone to be suicidal on the contrary the individual feel relief and has the opportunity to experience an empathic contact suicide profoundly affects individuals families workplaces neighbourhoods and societies the economic costs associated with suicide and self inflicted injuries are estimated to be in the billions of dollars surviving family members not only suffer the trauma of losing a loved one to suicide and may themselves be at higher risk for suicide and emotional problems mental pain is the basic ingredient of suicide edwin shneidman calls such pain psychache 1 meaning an ache in the psyche shneidman suggested that the key questions to ask a suicidal person are where do you hurt and how may i help you if the function of suicide is to put a stop to an unbearable flow of painful consciousness then it follows that the clinician s main task is to mollify that pain shneidman 1 also pointed out that the main sources of psychological pain such as shame guilt rage loneliness hopelessness and so forth stem from frustrated or thwarted psychological needs these psychological needs include the need for achievement for affiliation for autonomy for counteraction for exhibition for nurturance for order and for understanding shneidman 2 who is considered the father of suicidology has proposed the following definition of suicide currently in the western world suicide is a conscious act of self induced annihilation best understood as a multidimensional malaise in a needful individual who defines an issue for which the suicide is perceived as the best solution shneidman has also suggested that that suicide is best understood not so much as a movement toward death as it is a movement away from something and that something is always the same intolerable emotion unendurable pain or unacceptable anguish strategies involving restriction of access to common methods of suicide have proved to be effective in reducing suicide rates however there is a need to adopt multi sectoral approaches involving other levels of intervention and activities such as crisis centers there is compelling evidence indicating that adequate prevention and treatment of depression alcohol and substance abuse can reduce suicide rates school based interventions involving crisis management self esteem enhancement and the development of coping skills and healthy decision making have been demonstrated to reduce the risk of suicide among the youth worldwide the prevention of suicide has not been adequately addressed due to basically a lack of awareness of suicide as a major problem and the taboo in many societies to discuss openly about it in fact only a few countries have included prevention of suicide among their priorities reliability of suicide certification and reporting is an issue in great need of improvement it is clear that suicide prevention requires intervention also from outside the health sector and calls for an innovative comprehensive multi sectoral approach including both health and non health sectors e g education labour police justice religion law politics the media a stimulating read a real page turner perfect for those nights when your girlfriend just left you for a sushi chef and stomped a hole in your heart with a spiked high heel shoe this book examines what we know about the phenomenon of suicide by cop and places this behavior in a broader context for example some murder victims perhaps as many as a quarter provoke the murderer to some extent into killing them so called victim precipitated homicide in some cases it has been suspected that murderers kill and act thereafter in such a way as to provoke the state into executing them the authors then examine some of the issues specific to suicide by cop such as whether there is a racial bias in these acts and what the legal implications are finally they discuss the process of hostage negotiation

what suicides would say to those left behind and what they would tell others thinking of taking their own lives additionally the book conveys powerful messages from suicide bombers warning potential terrorists of the serious karmic consequences that await them for anyone contemplating suicide or euthanasia the book offers profound sometimes unsettling insight into the ramifications of these acts this book is the outcome of a field study of 162 suicide cases conducted in two suicide prone upazilas of jheneidah district in bangladesh the adolescent females and males were found to be the most suicide prone the major factors that drive the victims to commit suicide were found to be bad relationship between husbands and wives family quarrels poverty suffering from chronic and incurable diseases etc in jheneidah the majority of the suicide victims were young housewives between 16â 25 years of age unmet dowry demands the desire of husband to marry for the second time and family quarrels led to torture of young housewives by their husbands and in laws specially mother in laws illiteracy poverty and total economic dependence on husbands or parents appeared to be the major contributory factors behind these suicide cases it is suggested that the laws against polygamy and dowry system should be strictly enforced and special legal aid should be provided to help the parents of suicide victims the book also discusses the socio economic and psychological conditions of suicide victims the factors which compelled them to commit suicide methods of committing suicide and the months timing and place of suicide a brief description of 19 suicide cases has been given in the book some measures for reducing and preventing the incidence of suicide have also been suggested the official death rates from suicide vary considerably between countries in the world for which data are available they range from 3 to 45 persons a year per 100 000 of population historically the higher rates of suicide are in the older age groups and in males however the general trend in the last twenty years has been for suicide increasing in the younger age groups 15 34 and in females it has been suggested that this development is related to the phenomenon of attempted suicide of which the rates in most industrialized countries have doubled and in some countries even tripled over the past two decades the average rate of attempted suicide is now estimated to be around 200 per 100 000 for males and 350 for females almost two thirds of these occur before the age of thirty although the majority of attempted suicide are not intended to be lethal once a suicide attempt has been made there is more likelihood of subsequent death by suicide as many as ten percent of people who have made a previous unsuccessful attempt commit suicide at a later stage in their lives persons with increased likelihood to commit suicide are youngsters from disrupted families and from families with a history of suicide drug and alcohol addiction those who have failed at school the unemployed and those suffering from depression this book systematically presents and classifies the latest advances in suicide research in contemporary china examines the status quo of suicides in china and analyzes the reasons for suicides among three high risk groups namely rural females teenagers and the elderly it reveals the deep seated influence of traditional chinese values and socio cultural customs on suicide and puts forward a way to prevent suicide this book argues that high suicide rates stem from flaws in the social fabric effectively reducing suicide rates and mitigating the damage done by suicide as a social disease is not only the responsibility of the state government but also that of social educational and medical professionals finally a book that explains suicide using the latest research in suicidology a must read

for mental health professionals and the survivors of suicide who want to understand why suicide happens the material in this book should be incorporated into the curriculum of psychology and psychiatry because suicide is such a vital topic that is hardly covered in medical schools due to the lack of a coherent theory of the brain in general and suicide in particular this is an important book for all professionals who deal with mental disorders in general and suicide in particular it is the author's fifth book where suicide is explained not as a mysterious process but as a natural consequence of the reactions of the brain under certain conditions when suffering mental disorders the author begins with a brief summary of the statistics of the whos the hows and the wheres of suicide this gives us a clear idea of the magnitude of the problem of suicide of the cost not only in lives but of the emotional toll of the survivors as well as the financial burdens on society as a whole then as an important first step to understanding the medical community's standard approaches to mental disease he reviews briefly the current psychiatric terminology and the diagnostic tools concerning mental disorders he presents the most accepted current theories and models of suicide he explains what a psychiatric emergency is and what to expect if one ever encounters such a situation and he explains how suicide risk assessment is currently done along with other important considerations he proceeds to explain in everyday language where possible his theory of how the brain works beginning with a simple explanation of how neurons communicate with each other later he explains how the brain controls the body and how we see with the back of our heads how memory systems become a logical extension or expansion of our sensory and motor systems awareness and attention are introduced first as an evolutionary tool that aids the senses gather more information from the environment and ultimately as tools that aid in thinking reasoning and constructing our past our lives and our identities but all this would mean nothing without the introduction of emotions and how the brain constructs contexts he explains how emotions are an integral part of memories and how these are related to contexts how basically the brain has created a very concise and compact filing memory system a clear explanation of how emotions are triggered regulated and dissipated is next these lead to a learned discussion of how these various systems can go haywire causing mental disorders a brief but perhaps new and revolutionary approach to these mental disorders is presented next including obsessive compulsive disorder delirium dementia and other amnesic disorders manic depression and depression and schizophrenia ultimately it becomes clear how under certain conditions these disorders can lead to suicide the difference between attempters and completers is also explained he then presents a suicide autopsy as an exercise to show how varied the opinions of experts in the field of suicidology are and compares it to his own theories and lets the reader decide for himself who is closer to the truth the fallacy of many expert opinions of where research needs to go is presented the book gives a few words of advice on various therapies and the rationality of their approaches and cautions against their limitations the book devotes a chapter to suicide prevention in the military and how these efforts are bound to fail and another chapter on suicide prevention the author makes important suggestions of how to prevent suicide and lessen suicide rates particularly among the young and lastly a chapter is devoted to the specifics of grief for suicide survivors this book is a personal history and apology written by one of this century's most distinguished small mammal ecologists for a life in science spent

of celebrity suicides the spotlight shines on the lonely last moments of kurt cobain and ernest hemingway abbie hoffman and adolf hitler dorothy dandridge sigmund freud hunter s thompson and others death becomes them explores their sadness and madness their accomplishments and the circumstances that led to their irreversible decision and wishes them all a fond final good bye drawing on extensive clinical and epidemiological evidence as well as personal experience thomas joiner provides the most coherent and persuasive explanation ever given of why and how people overcome life s strongest instinct self preservation he tests his theory against diverse facts about suicide rates among men and women white and african american men anorexics athletes prostitutes and physicians members of cults sports fans and citizens of nations in crisis suicide is one of the major causes of violent death in our societies the fact that adolescents and the elderly are the two population groups with the highest rates of suicide challenges many assumptions of the past regarding human development by the time they reach their teens many adolescents lack the necessary skills to deal with stressful events in a healthy life enhancing way at the same time the last stage of human development is not necessarily one in which people feel fulfilled in this book ramón martínez de piñón expands the theory of lazarus and folkman 1984 for coping with stress in order to show that toxic shame is one of the most important personal and environmental constraints inhibiting one s ability to cope with suicide and suicide related events in a healthy way rod david an outstanding student a leader and an award winning drug free athlete unexpectedly and tragically took his own life during his senior year of high school rod grew up in a loving and supportive family and was surrounded by an adoring community what went wrong showing his deep felt emotion for his son ward david writes with honesty and candor about a very difficult subject with the purpose of saving lives of potentially suicidal youngsters a talented composer and guitarist david had so much to live for but ultimately could not find a way to overcome his demons as gloria and her family struggle to pick up the pieces she comes to realize that thousands of families in the united states suffer the loss of a loved one through suicide each year as her story moves from personal to societal gloria examines the warning signs for those contemplating suicide as well as ways to help those struggling with hopelessness and depression she also provides a support network for those left behind after such a devastating act including tips on how to slowly work through the guilt shame and paralyzing grief that springs up in the wake of such profound loss these emotions can eventually be turned into survival skills that make getting through each day possible coping with suicide is never an easy task but damage done can help readers realize that they are not alone the suicide of a parent has life long consequences few more traumatic scenarios exist and counselors often struggle for ways to help clients deal with its effects few understand the pain and life altering effects of these tragedies better than children who have experienced the suicide of a parent despite this there are few texts that incorporate and evaluate the first person accounts of grief following a suicide while advancing a method for helping losing a parent to suicide analyzes stories of parent suicides and explores the grief and coping processes that follow discovering the strategies methods and modes of therapy that have empowered grieving individuals and helped them rebuild their lives finally a book that explains suicide a must read for the survivors of suicide who want to understand why suicide happens and it also should prove extremely helpful for anyone suffering mental

disorders the material in this book should be incorporated into the curriculum of psychology and psychiatry because suicide is such a vital topic hardly covered in medical schools it is an important book for all professionals who deal with mental disorders in general and suicide in particular it is the authors fourth book where suicide is explained not as a mysterious process but as a natural consequence of the reactions of the brain under certain conditions when suffering mental disorders in this book on suicide the author begins with a brief summary of the statistics of the whos the hows and the wheres of suicide this gives us a clear idea of the magnitude of the problem of suicide of the cost not only in lives but of the emotional toll of the survivors as well as the financial burdens on society as a whole then as an important first step to understanding the medical communitys standard approaches to mental disease he reviews briefly the current psychiatric terminology and the diagnostic tools concerning mental disorders he presents the most accepted current theories and models of suicide he explains what a psychiatric emergency is and what to expect if one ever encounters such a situation and he explains how suicide risk assessment is currently done along with other important considerations he proceeds to explain in every day language where possible his theory of how the brain works beginning with a simple explanation of how neurons communicate with each other later he explains how the brain controls the body and how we see with the back of our heads how memory systems become a logical extension or expansion of our sensory and motor systems awareness and attention are introduced first as an evolutionary tool that aids the senses gather more information from the environment and ultimately as tools that aid in thinking reasoning and constructing our past our lives and our identities but all this would mean nothing without the introduction of emotions and how the brain constructs contexts he explains how emotions are an integral part of memories and how these are related to contexts how basically the brain has created a very concise and compact filing memory system a clear explanation of how emotions are triggered regulated and dissipated is next these leads to a learned discussion of how these various systems can go haywire leading to mental disorders a brief but perhaps new and revolutionary approach to these mental disorders is presented next including obsessive compulsive disorder delirium dementia and other amnesic disorders manic depression and depression and schizophrenia ultimately it becomes clear how under certain conditions these disorders can lead to suicide he then presents a suicide autopsy as an exercise to show how varied the opinions of experts in the field of suicidology are and compares it to his own theories and lets the reader decide for himself who is closer to the truth finally he gives a few words of advice on various therapies and the rationality of their approaches and cautions against their limitations he closes with some important suggestions of how to lessen suicide rates particularly among the young somewhere in the world in the next forty seconds a person is going to commit suicide globally suicides account for 50 percent of all violent deaths among men and 71 percent for women despite suicide prevention programs therapy and pharmacological treatments the suicide rate is either increasing or remaining high around the world media and suicide holds traditional and emergent media accountable for influencing an individual s decision to commit suicide global experts present research historical analysis theoretical disputes including discussion on the werther and papageno effects and policy regarding the media s impact on suicide they answer questions about the effects of different types of media

and storytelling show how the impact of social media can be diminished discuss internet bullying mass shootings and mass suicides show the effects of recovery stories and much more the editors also present examples of suicide policy in the united states switzerland the united kingdom ireland and hong kong on how to best communicate reporting guidelines to decrease the copycat effect especially in less developed nations where most of the world s nearly one million suicides occur each year although there is much work to be done to prevent media influenced suicide this innovative volume will contribute a large piece to this complex puzzle since the night inspector haritos had the brilliant idea to offer his chest as a shield in order to save elena kousta from a bullet fired by her stepson his life has changed radically haritos long convalescence has given his wife the opportunity to take control and now subdued and tamed he witnesses a shocking suicide captured live on tv the victim iason favieros a former revolutionary activist who had been jailed during the dictatorship of the colonels had built up a sprawling business empire in a surprisingly short period of time including olympic contracts this tragedy is quickly followed by the suicides of a well known greek mp and a national journalist at his own party with the police and the press left groping in the dark inspector haritos is under pressure to solve the mystery that is lurking behind this series of public suicides unveiling the secrets buried in the victims past

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
